Psalm 146:3-6 Do not put your trust in princes, in human beings, who cannot save. When their spirit departs, they return to the ground; on that very day their plans come to nothing. Blessed are those whose help is the God of Jacob, whose hope is in the Lord their God. He is the Maker of heaven and earth, the sea, and everything in them—He remains faithful forever.

Jeremiah 17:5 Thus says the Lord, "Cursed is the man who trusts in mankind and makes flesh his strength, and whose heart turns away from the Lord.

Psalm 118:9 It is better to take refuge in the LORD than to put confidence in rulers. No one can deny that election season is in full swing. It's difficult to read the news, turn on the TV, open the mailbox or read our electronic communications that we don't encounter one candidate or the other letting us know that November is fast approaching. A second thing few can deny is that this country is deeply divided.

Opinion poll after opinion poll indicate that few are undecided about whom or which political party they will be voting for in the coming months. The problem is, the division we see across this country goes beyond the voting booth. This split is dividing households, families, friends, and communities. Add to this problem the fact that we no longer know how to talk about hot button issues. Gone, it seems, are the days when we could discuss, argue, and debate each other with respect. The world now teaches that if someone disagrees with you, they are haters, bigots or phobes of one sort or the other. We forward that we're tolerant of others, but our words and actions tell a totally different story. Love of neighbor, it seems, is a lost concept. We can't even agree to disagree and remain friends. The basis of this problem is one of self-centeredness where we place our trust.

King Solomon, the wisest person to have lived wrote in Proverbs 3:5-6, "Trust in the Lord with all your heart and lean not on your own understanding; in all your ways submit to him, and he will make your paths straight." To be certain, trusting people isn't a bad idea, in fact, trusting people, certain people, is wise and essential. The Bible makes it clear in Genesis that God does not desire for any of us to be alone. God made Eve for Adam, and for each of us God desires companionship in some form. In the same way, God gave us leaders to guide us and protect us so that we can have an orderly society, provided they too listen to God and lean on Him for understanding.

When we put trust in people, we can reap the fruits of a healthy relationship. A trusting couple will experience peace and calm in their relationship as a result. When questionable things occur, and we communicate, issues get resolved. Friends who trust will talk, share se-

crets, and bear one another's burdens. Children who trust adults are more likely to share and seek support. But our trust in people cannot be blind or without limit.

People, unlike God, can damage trust, whether accidentally or intentionally. If we're accustomed to running to people every time we need help, and not to God, we will find ourselves disappointed. Sometimes people don't want to hear our problems, sometimes they are unavailable. The same isn't true with God, He is always available, always listens and always strengthens and answers. And like our relationships with people, we must also build our relationship with God. How else do we learn to trust in Him?

God, unlike our fellow humans, is a trustworthy refuge, a permanent structure, a person to run to and a place to reside. Humans cannot offer us the same promises of God, that's why we need to keep our focus on God. He is and will forever remain trustworthy. "God is our refuge and strength, an ever-present help in trouble. Therefore we will not fear, though the earth give way and the mountains fall into the heart of the sea, though its waters roar and foam and the mountains quake with their surging" (Psalm 46:1-3). So in this time of tension, in this season of local and national elections, in this time of division, I urge you to cling to the One who is ruler over all, who is our sure hope for the future, and never forget, even though we may fear for what is to come, pray as St. Paul instructed Timothy, "I urge, then, first of all, that petitions, prayers, intercession and thanksgiving be made for all people— for kings and all those in authority, that we may live peaceful and quiet lives in all godliness and holiness. This is good, and pleases God our Savior, who wants all people to be saved and to come to a knowledge of the truth. For there is one God and one mediator between God and mankind, the man Christ Jesus, who gave himself as a ransom for all people" (1 Timothy 2:1-6 Pastor Steve
